As more and more journals in Canada transition their journals to open access, they are beginning to consider how they can increase the visibility, accessibility, reputation, usage and impact of their journals. the Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ) is a trusted and extensive index of open access journals from around the world, ensuring quality content is freely available online for everyone. This session will explain how the DOAJ works, the benefits of becoming part of the DOAJ community, and tips for preparing an application for inclusion in the DOAJ.

9:50 - 10:35 Launching a New Journal through the Subscribe to Open Model

The University of Toronto Press has recently launched the *Journal* of City Climate Policy and Economy (JCCPE) through a Subscribe to Open model. The model enables research papers to be published as immediate open access at no cost to researchers since the publication costs are covered by subscribers paying an annual fee, similar to a regular subscription model. Once an annual subscription threshold is met, the volume year becomes available as open access.

Coalition Publica, a partnership between Érudit and the Public Knowledge Project, has been chaging the landscape of research dissemination and digital scholarly publishing of social sciences and humanities research in Canada. This session will describe the progress that Coalition Publica has been making through their non-commercial, open source national infrastructure for digital scholarly publishing. The session will also focus on how Plan S and other open access policies are dramatically changing research requirements in Canada.

Panelists include a member of Érudit's operations team who will present an overview of the new requirements for governmentfunded research in Québec journals, and the managing editors of three Québec journals who will voice their primary concerns.
